

Dear Students and Parents:



AT MONMOUTH, WE ARE PARTICULARLY PROUD of our Greek Life history. The first national fraternity for women, Pi Beta Phi, was founded at Monmouth College in 1867, followed shortly thereafter by the founding of Kappa Kappa Gamma in 1870, the third oldest women's fraternal organization. The three women's and four men's

fraternities that make up the present Greek community comprise more than 22 percent of the student body. Each chapter places special emphasis on academic achievement, holding its own study hours and programming to enhance academic performance. One in four students who belong to the Greek system graduates with *cum laude* honors or higher. The all-Greek GPA is higher than the all-campus GPA.

While the number of Greek chapters on some campuses is declining, at Monmouth it is growing! In fact, two former chapters have recolonized in recent years, and efforts are under way to bring additional chapters to our campus. The board of trustees has recently endorsed an initiative expanding college support for Greek Life, which has already resulted in the first new construction of Greek housing in more than 40 years.

While joining a Greek organization isn't for everyone, membership provides an opportunity to form lifelong friendships, promotes discipline that can lead to academic success and develops leadership skills that can translate into success in life. Membership in these Greek-letter organizations does require an extra commitment of time, energy and resources, but it also offers many rewards.


Please take a few minutes to review this booklet. I hope it will help you decide whether or not Greek Life should be part of your Monmouth College experience.

Greeks seek academic success

Men's and women's fraternities emphasize the importance of scholastic excellence through study-skill workshops, peer tutoring, and study groups.

- > At Monmouth, men and women in fraternal organizations earn a higher GPA than non-members.
- Students are more likely to graduate from college if they belong to fraternal organizations.
